Chloë Bass: Wayfinding

What

The Pulitzer Arts Foundation presents *Chloë Bass: Wayfinding*, a public-art exhibition of more than 20 site-specific sculptures that will be installed across the Pulitzer's outdoor spaces and neighboring areas—in a tree grove behind the museum building; directly in front of the building; in *Park-Like*, the garden across the street; and in a lot behind the nearby Spring Church.

The works comprising the exhibition are organized into four "chapters," each located at one of the four sites, where it will be anchored by a billboard that poses a question by the artist concerning human emotions, from intimacy and desire to anxiety and loss. Accompanying sculptures will include snippets of related texts and images that encourage private reflection, intensifying everyday moments. Through these meditations, the work engages the viewer in an exploration of both visual and written language. In addition to the sculptures, *Wayfinding* includes a site-specific audio artwork narrated by the artist and others, which will be accessible by phone via a call-in number.

Chloë Bass (b. 1984) is a New York-based artist who works in performance, publications, installation, and social spaces, using daily life as a subject for deep research into scales of human intimacy. Wayfinding is a subproject of Obligation to Others Holds Me in My Place, a poetic investigation of intimacy within the immediate family. The project was originally commissioned by The Studio Museum in Harlem, in New York City, and presented at the nearby St. Nicholas Park in 2019–20. For the St. Louis presentation, Bass is working with community partners to expand the Studio Museum commission, adding the fourth chapter, making a new audio artwork, and ensuring that this iteration of the work is specific to St. Louis.
